In collaboration with the Community Foundation of Broward, we launched the Artist Innovation Grant, which awards 10 artists with \$10,000 stipends; and we reinstated the \$1 million annual Cultural & Artistic Facilities Capital Grant reinforcing our commitment to developing cultural infrastructure.

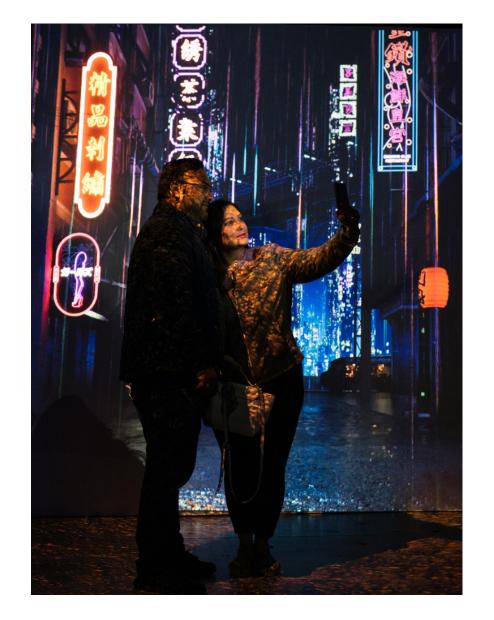
Broward County Cultural Division

ECONOMIC IMPACT

The Cultural Division team participated in the national **Arts** & **Economic Prosperity 6 (AEP6) Study**, which examined the correlation between audience expenditures and participation in arts events, as well as the ensuing economic activity. Data

was analyzed by Americans for the Arts and included in a comprehensive national and local profile, outlining the economic impact of our nonprofit arts and culture sector.

aspect of our community. Venues and arts facilities are unequivocally regarded as crucial pillars and their hypothetical disappearance would elicit a profound sense of loss. The arts, serving as a source of pride for our neighborhoods, motivate attendance at events with the aim of ensuring their continuity for generations to come.

The biggest economic impact of arts and culture organizations is the substantial event-related spending by their audiences, a phenomenon uncommon in most other industries. Among the study's findings: in 2022, the **nonprofit**

BILLION: GOVERNMENT TAX arts and culture industry in Broward County generated \$138,773,054 in spending by the organizations, catalyzing an additional \$247,830,621 in event-related spending by their audiences.

In the same year, over 5.8 million individuals attended in-person arts and culture events, expending an average of \$41.47 per person, per event — a figure inclusive of expenses beyond admission, such as

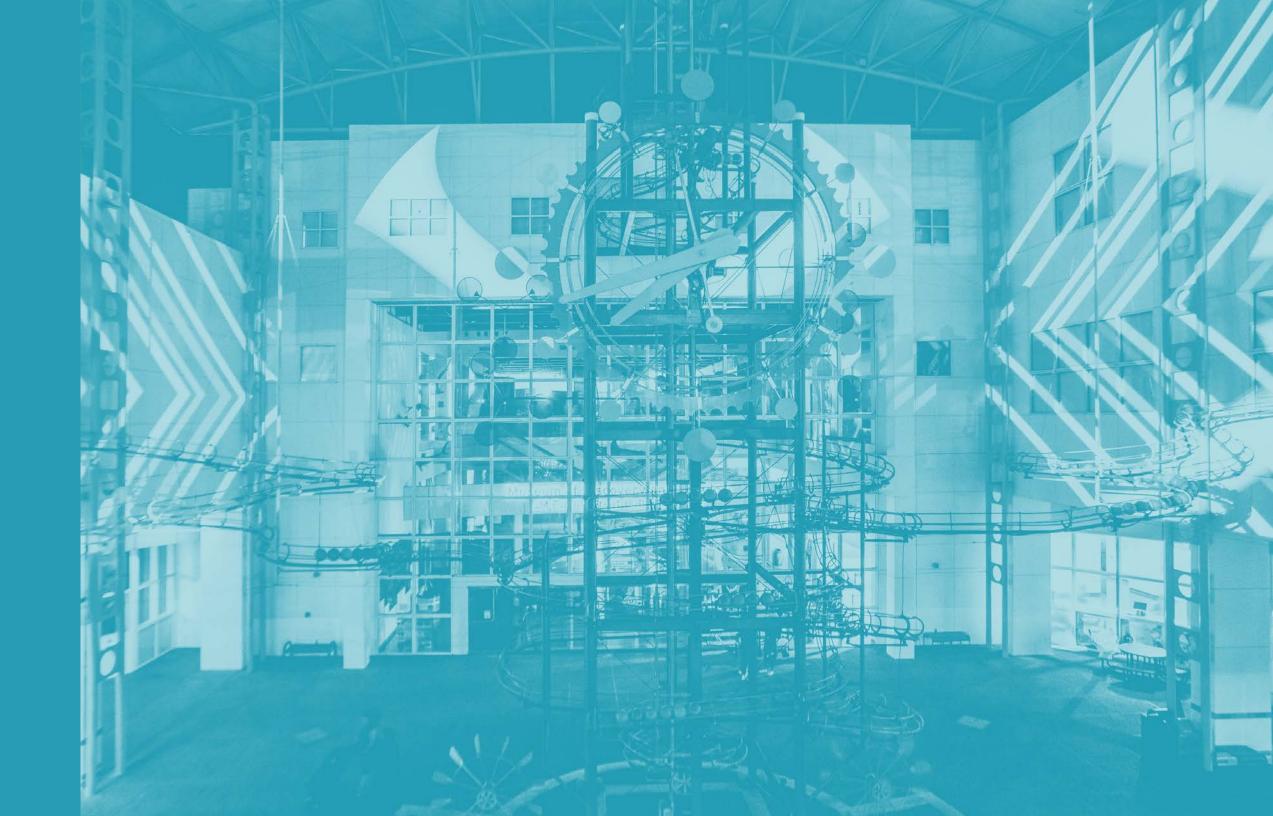
meals, parking, and lodging. This event-related spending assumes a pivotal role as income for local businesses.

The non-profit arts and culture sector made a substantial contribution of **\$386,603,675** to Broward's economy and sustained **6,718 jobs**.

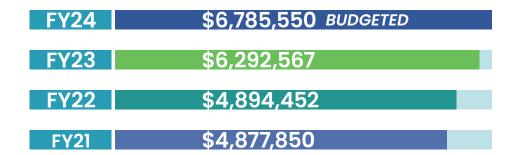

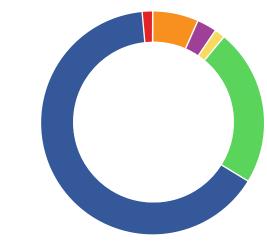

\$3,000 to support both new and existing projects.

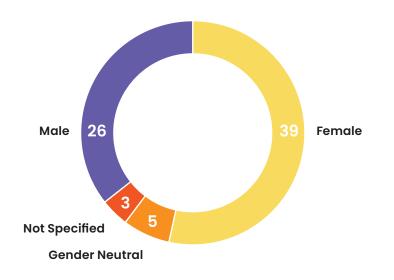

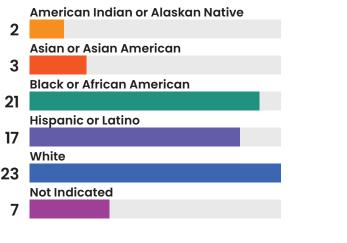

2 PUBLIC ART & DESIGN



Broward's Public Art & Design Program, which will celebrate its 50th Anniversary in 2026, is one of the oldest programs of its kind in the U.S. The program stewards the County's extensive art collection (valued at \$31,287,290).

As we move forward and expand the Public Art & Design Program beyond the traditional functionally-integrated art, we're pursuing new commissions and projects related to digital and virtual public art at the intersection of art and technology, including the development of our public art collection in the Metaverse.

Navigating the intricacies of public art projects tied to construction timelines, the program reported art expenditures for Fiscal Year 2023 totaling \$890,617. This sum reflects commitments to ongoing commissions and conservation activities, illustrating an impactful investment in cultural enrichment.

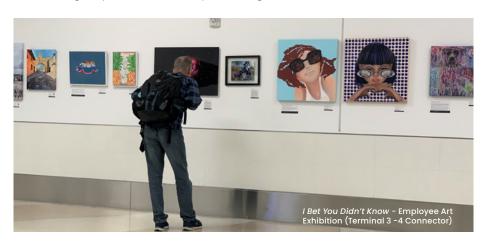




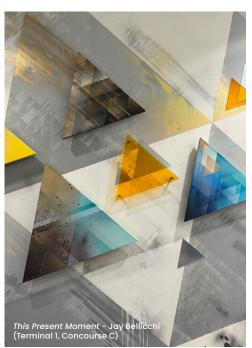
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AIRPORT EXHIBITIONS

The Broward County Aviation Department, in collaboration with the Cultural Division, has transformed Fort Lauderdale–Hollywood International Airport (FLL) into a dynamic cultural hub through the presentation of rotating exhibitions. This initiative enhances the airport's aesthetic appeal and provides enriching experiences for passengers and visitors.









Notable highlights include the installation of the first immersive art exhibition at FLL, featuring Jay Bellicchi's *This Present Moment*. Conservation efforts include the restoration of Alice Adams's *Stone and Glass Gardens*, and Jody Pinto's *Light Cylinders*. These endeavors underscore the program's dedication to both showcasing contemporary art and maintaining the integrity of existing pieces, making FLL a destination that seamlessly blends travel with artistic exploration.

Broward Teaching Artist Credentialing Program

The Broward Teaching Artist Credentialing Program is dedicated to the development and business of teaching artists and arts-based practitioners working within schools and across multiple sectors.

With its three-level, regionally adopted curriculum, this program assures that those certified have demonstrated a mastery of skills commensurate with their level(s) of certification.



Program providers across government, education, and children and family services recognize that graduates of the Broward Teaching Artist Credentialing Program have received excellent training to deliver high-quality services to multiple audiences in a variety of environments.

Program Highlights

- Four Level 1 graduates continued their work with Level 2.
- Two Master Teaching Artists and Lead Faculty presented at the 2023 Florida Alliance for Arts Education annual summit in Jacksonville, FL. Teaching Artist Nzingah Oniwosan received the FAAE Doris Leeper Arts Education Award.
- Five Master Teaching Artists received training to facilitate BTAC programming across disciplines.
- Master Teaching Artists & Lead Faculty conducted four professional development workshops for 30 teachers and assistants, reaching an additional 143 students across eight classrooms through workshops at Gulfstream Early Learning Center.
- Master Teaching Artists conducted 11 workshops, serving 330 youth.

Destination Sistrunk Cultural Center

Destination Sistrunk, a Cultural Heritage initiative situated in the heart of the Sistrunk Neighborhood, is committed to preserving and showcasing the rich black history of the region. Over the past year, the Destination Sistrunk Cultural Center concluded its inaugural season of programming, drawing more than 1,000 attendees and participants.

Cultural Heritage and Capacity Building

Destination Sistrunk showcased a dynamic array of programming, engaging and enriching the community.

Throughout the year, 24 meetings and events were presented, including Jazz at The Circuit, Sistrunk Fashion Week, SongFest, Spoken is The Word, and Beyond the Limelight. Additionally, a mural by artist Julien James was installed at the Westside Gazette Newspaper Building, located at 545 NW 7th Terrace, Fort Lauderdale.

As part of Destination Sistrunk's initiatives, individuals and organizations were honored with 12-month residencies, including six individuals and four non-profit organizations.

IGNITE BROWARD 2023

39,088 people attended the 2023 edition of the IGNITE Broward festival of art, light and technology at its two locations in Fort Lauderdale and Dania Beach. The five-days and nights of immersive art and light was presented with free access to all, reflecting our pillars of equity, access, innovation, and collaboration.

As the sun set each night, Fort Lauderdale's Esplanade Park came alive with mesmerizing outdoor art and light projections, sculptures and interactive displays. The daytime component of IGNITE Broward took the excitement indoors, with video and light exhibitions at Mad Arts in Dania Beach. This dynamic blend of outdoor and indoor opportunities provided a sensoryrich journey through the convergence of technology and artistic expression.







Programming highlights featured a Youth Forest Planting led by artist Akiko Yamashita, lectures, and Spanish poetry readings and breakdancing performances.

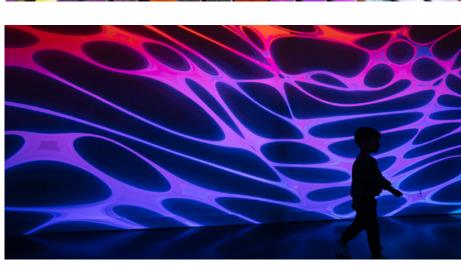
